
I suspect, I will miss some things dreadfully...and others not so much! Just like those of you have retired have come to realize!



“Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen.” Luke 24:5



Tired feet. Heavy hearts. Tear-stained cheeks. Grief stricken souls. Tired women made their way to the tomb. Sorrow heavier than the weight of spices they carry. They are going to finish wrapping Jesus' dead body with spices as an act of love. It is a practical way of dealing with the harsh reality of death. The spices will slow down the natural process of decay.

They trudge forward mostly in silence. Early morning sun light peaks over the hills. Birds greet the sun. But the women are numb and only focus on getting to the tomb. Love pulls them forward. They have no plan. They give no thought to the huge stone blocking the grave entrance. Grief can be like that! But God has a series of surprises in store for them.

Surprise number one.

They reach the tomb. The stone is moved! It is rolled back from the entrance. How? And by whom? They were too numb to think it through. They are on autopilot.

Surprise number two.

There is no corpse. They enter the tomb and Jesus' body is missing. Now what?! This is the right tomb. Three days earlier they watched as his bloody and dead body had been laid in this very tomb. They are bewildered!

Surprise number three.

Two men in dazzling white clothing suddenly appear, standing next to them in the empty grave. The men (angels?) are matter of fact. “Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here. He is risen.” The women are startled and afraid. Confused and bewildered. Is it possible? Could he really be alive? Death is not the final word? Life is more powerful than death? Slowly the message sinks in.

Surprise number four.

God is more powerful than we can know or even imagine. There is so much we don't know! Slowly these grief-stricken women came to grips with the reality of Jesus' resurrection. They were the first witnesses of the empty tomb, the first evangelists of the good news of Jesus' victory over sin and death.

In our crazy world torn by disease and death let us take note of the experience of these early heart-broken believers. May their faith spark hope in us. May their discovery pierce the barriers of doubt and grief that hold us. Life is more powerful than death. Love defeats evil. Hope overcomes despair. Jesus is alive.

May our hope and trust in God's love through Jesus be renewed this Easter!

NEWS FROM THE STAFF PARISH RELATIONS COMMITTEE

On March 4, 2022 Bishop Karen Oliveto and District Superintendent Rev. Elizabeth McVicker informed CUMC that effective July 1, 2022 our new pastor will be Rev. Lisa Petty.

For the past five years Rev. Lisa has been the pastor of Montrose United Methodist Church in Montrose, CO. Prior to that she served for five years as pastor of Rifle United Methodist Presbyterian Church in Rifle, CO.

Rev. Lisa graduated from Iliff School of Theology with a Master of Divinity in 2009, received her Local Pastor License in January 2012, was commissioned as a Provisional Elder in June 2012, and became an Ordained Elder in June 2014.

Her history in ministry includes extensive experience in youth and young adult ministries dating back to 1998.

There is much more to her resume that I could repeat here, none of which tells us who she really is and what she is about. So, I asked her.

Question: Rev. Lisa what was the life pathway that lead you to become a Methodist minister?

I grew up in San Diego and all over southern California with a United Methodist Pastor for a father. I have 3 siblings, one older sister, one younger sister and a younger brother. My brother is also an ordained UMC pastor and serves the people of Colorado Springs at St Paul UMC. I am also a fourth generation Methodist pastor as my grandmother was one of the first women ordained a Deacon in the Methodist Episcopal Church. After a long 10 years of denying my call to ministry and finally going back to school to finish an undergraduate degree, I moved to Denver to do my Master of Divinity in two and one half years.

Question: Can you tell us about your family and, perhaps, interests outside of the church walls?

My spouse, JC Croy, and I enjoy mountain bike riding, snowboarding, jogging and kayaking. Though he does more of the former and I do more of the latter. We are barely empty-nesters and look forward to our kids coming to visit when we are settled in. I enjoy any cup of coffee (as long as there is a splash of cream), a bold red wine, and a savory breakfast, but only if they are over a good conversation. People who dive deep into conversation make everything taste better.

Question: Can you summarize your theology for us, in less than 10,000 words?

I believe God enjoys our company as much as we enjoy God's, and that we often put God into a box through laws and rules and our own imagination and interpretation of scripture, which only serves us, but does not serve God. For I believe God is bigger than any box or description or boundaries we can put on God. I believe God rejoices when we show love to all our neighbors, especially those we find hard to love, and is deeply saddened by the ways we sow hate or discourse. I believe in a Christ who does the same, and whose grace is beyond measure.

Question: Is there some interesting tidbit you'd like to share about yourself?

My body is absolutely a temple and I end up painting its walls when they feel bare or unfinished. Seems even Jesus had a tattoo on his thigh after he was raised to life!

Question: Finally, what is your message to the members of Christ United Methodist Church as we anticipate your ministry?

I am excited to serve the people of Salt Lake and particularly in Mill Creek. I am praying for all the ways the Holy Spirit will show up and move us to be a community of faith that will show all people they belong to God and to one another - not just by our words, but by our actions.

Prior to the announcement that Rev. Lisa would be appointed to serve our congregation, the Staff Parrish Relations Committee had the opportunity to share dinner, a devotional and several hours of conversation with Rev. Lisa and JC. I believe that every one of us came away feeling like we will be blessed to have them with us and excited for the energy, enthusiasm and new ideas they bring to the table.

Four years ago, Pinecliff Camp and Retreat Center's Board of Directors and Site Committee decided to build an Americans with Disabilities ACT (ADA) compliant bathhouse. Plans were drawn up by an Architect Engineer, an engineering report was prepared by an Engineering firm, and a building permit was issued by Summit County, Utah. The project site was cleared, and a sewer line was installed. The project was placed on hold in 2019 due to the lack of funding; the following year the Covid-19 pandemic hit and this project has been on hold ever since.

With a grant made possible by the Association of UMC Camping Retreat Ministries (UMCRM), we now have the opportunity to complete this project. We are requesting volunteers for certain portions of the construction. It is expected that site preparation work and pour of the foundation will be performed by a general contractor (TBD); rough plumbing, electrical and HVAC work will be performed by licensed professionals (TBD); however, the balance of the construction will be performed by various volunteer organizations (Oklahoma Mission, NOMADS, and UTAH UMC groups). Board members will oversee the project throughout its construction.

Those who have construction experience and want to help build it are requested to visit Pinecliff's website for more information. There you will find a Questionnaire. The downloadable form can be emailed back. The address is at the bottom of the form. The pdf form can be filled out on a computer then emailed, or it can be printed out and filled in by hand, then scanned and emailed back. Not all jobs are construction oriented. Site support such as cooking, food prep, cleaning is also needed.

Many years ago a committee was formed to replace the windows in the Narthex. The present stained glass with the quote from Isaiah replaced triangles of red, green, and blue like in the sanctuary.

We had plans at the time to replace the sanctuary windows and have finally begun that process.

The 8 panels on the east side will be replaced first. The design is an outline of the Wasatch Front as seen from the church roof, north to south. The sky will be clear glass and the mountains a mix of textured and sand-blasted glass. Since there is no color, much more light will come through to the sanctuary.

There will be an opportunity to purchase panels as a memorial to loved ones. As the process gets underway we will share more information.






Deepest Condolences to Duane Garwood and family and friends on the death of Duane's wife Maxine Garwood, March 29th.

Round-Up for FPSL!!



Several weeks ago, an FPSL staff member was in drive-thru line at a local fast-food restaurant. As he handed them his card for payment, the cashier asked if he would like to "round-up" to the nearest dollar to help support a local charity. "Of course," he said, "I'll never even notice," and he didn't. Rounding up has become a growing option for organizations to receive valuable funding. FPSL is excited to announce this new way to give to our organization – the Round-Up option.

Currently, FPSL has regular recurring funders that donate by sending in a check or online while visiting our website. Recently, FPSL Executive Director, Brian Diggs, added a new donation button to the website making it possible for our donors to opt into a Round-Up option. Studies show that many people feel more comfortable giving a little at a time using their credit or debit card. Whether you are buying groceries, filling up your gas tank, or purchasing a new pair of shoes, rounding up each time just makes sense for some people.

Here is how it works:

1. Visit our website at: www.familypromisesaltlake.org
2. Click the Donation Button on any page of the site.
3. Choose a one-time option, a monthly donation option, or the new Round-Up option.
4. Attach a credit or debit card to your donation choice (note: if you choose the Round-Up option you will be prompted to set a monthly limit to ensure your total for the month never exceeds the amount you set. For example, if you set a \$25 limit, our donation platform will stop "rounding up" once you reach \$25. You can cancel any of your online donations any time.)
5. You will have access to your own personal donation history page that you can access at any time to see how much you have given to FPSL.
